July Meeting



Our July meeting will be a learning opportunity provided by Aaron Sedivy, Conservatory Horticulturalist of the Denver Botanic Gardens.

Here's Aaron's story:

I grew up in Nebraska and have a Bachelor's Degree in Horticulture-Plant Science from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. In college, I worked at the Nebraska Statewide

Arboretum doing propagation of Nebraska native prairie plants and trees that can survive in various conditions found throughout the state. I interned at the Denver Botanic Gardens in 2009 in the Rock Alpine Garden and returned as a seasonal in spring of 2011. By the end of the year I was hired fulltime in Tropicals and I will never be the same again. Responsibilities include: Bromeliad, Gesneriad and tropical cacti collections, poison dart frog care, daily maintenance of the Conservatory and two of six tropical greenhouses as well as tropical plant production for plant sales and use at The Gardens. At home, I practice Xeriscape TM gardening, dogscaping, and urban farming with a focus on wildlife habitat development.

The presentation will focus on growing bromeliads in three significantly different environments at the Denver Botanic Gardens in Denver, Colorado. These include the Boettcher Memorial Tropical Conservatory, built of concrete in 1966, our state-of-the-art greenhouses which opened in 2010 and outdoor summer displays. BSI Standard Show

GOLD is something those of us in California appreciate since it was the Gold Rush that brought about our rapid rise as a state. The symbolic meaning of gold is strength and power. And this year the members of the San Diego Bromeliad Society have exhibited both with a very strong showing of 239 entries in the show. These were spectacular specimens, well grown outside, in drought ravaged California under shade cloth. The care given in growing each is shown in the 93 Award of Merit entries and 114 Blue First Place entries.

The Mulford B. Foster Award went to Dan Kinnard and Eloise Lau for a *Tillandsia tectorum* and the Morris Henry Hobbs Award went to *Tillandsia streptophylla x chiapensis* grown by David

It's been a crazy year with sporadic heavy storms and long stretches of warm dry days. Broms are coping as best they can, with premature blooms and generally odd growth. Still, there is lots of color popping in my back yard. Here I show *Tillandsia kretzii*, a beautiful mesic species from Guatemala, sporting a vivid red inflorescence and yellow flowers, and *T. streptophylla x chiapensis*, which began flowering in early May. Too early for this month's show? We shall see!





Kennedy. The Sweepstakes award went to Andy Siekkinen for his 51 entries in the Award of Merit or Blue categories. The two public awards for the "favorite" and the "weirdest" interestingly went to the same plant: Kay Quijada's *Neoregelia 'Fireball'* grown epiphytically.



Silver Awards to Division winners went to David Kennedy, Andy Siekkinen, Kay Quijada, and Monica Mroz. And there were 15 Bronze Awards given in each of the five divisions since there were so many tied numerical scores. Two of our newest members Monica Mroz and Rhonda Smoot won head table awards, Silver and Bronze respectively. So even if you are new to growing bromeliads, don't be intimidated, enter next year!

We also had an out of the ordinary educational exhibit of five different Puyas from Bob Wright. No, none of them were in bloom and most of you can guess why; he did have to haul them in. It was a nice follow up to our society's trip in April to the Huntington Gardens where we saw four different varieties of Puya in bloom!

Thanks to Scott Sandel for our new black back prop for the awards stage that really made our top winners look spectacular.

At last count there are 116 members of SDBS and a large portion worked and helped with the show which was certainly appreciated. I want to especially thank Dan Kinnard and Eloise Lau for managing to get all entries into the computer system and printing those great readable cards and statistics. A special shout out to our judges' clerks Bob Walters, Lee Baker, and Karen Rudd for working so diligently with our judges. Judge Oscar Allen from Oregon, Carole and Rick Richtmeyer from Texas put in a long hard 10 hour day, but from our prospective it was certainly worth it.

chair worked so tirelessly tending to all the myriad details that go into putting on a standard show: organizing the various show committees; working with the Botanical Foundation to be sure that the facilities are duly reserved; corresponding with BSI to register the show, gaining approval for the show schedule, and arranging for the Mulford Foster and Morris Henry Hobbes awards, and doing the follow-up bookkeeping on who won what; overseeing the set-up and take-down of the show room; and above all making sure that all the people working on the show have what they need to do their jobs.

Special thanks also needs to go out to Dan Kinnard and Eloise Lau who spent many hours on Friday as Classification chairs, working to make sure that every plant was properly identified and placed. To the clerks Bob Walters and Lee Baker who spent 10 hours on their feet assisting the judges. To Scott Sandel who (with Bob Vitacco) set up a great head table display. To Al Evans who, as treasurer, spent many hours collecting cash and, afterward, balancing the books and making sure that all the sellers got their money promptly.

In addition to the annual show, we also did a display at the **San Diego County Fair**. The theme of the fair commemorated the 100th anniversary of the 1915 Pan American Exhibition in Balboa Park, so the title of our exhibit was **Remembrance of Things Past** (a title borrowed from the French writer Marcel Proust). We included antiques commingled with the bromeliads. The exhibit gave us a chance to promote the SDBS show/sale and we also provided membership fliers to the public.

The exhibit won several awards (including a blue ribbon and an award for the best succulent in the fair—a dyckia hybrid in a decorative container, not to mention four awards for distinctive plants. With each award comes a cash prize. Thanks go out to Scott Sandel for his signage and plants, Dan and Eloise, Jim Wright, and Nancy Groves for plants, and to Nancy for her hours of labor.

On July 2 we also made presentations at the fair promoting bromeliads:

This was my first time ever participating in any type of plant show. In fact I have only been a member of the SDBS for a few months. For me, it was a surprising, wonderful, educational, and expensive weekend. I have only been growing, learning about, and selling some Tillandsia arrangements for 1½ years. I was surprised that I did so well, even the sale went well.

I felt I needed to enter in the categories that I thought were "safe" by entering 5 of my plants in the Decorative Container division, 1 in the Artistic Arrangement division and others in the Novice division. Of the 12 Tillandsia entries, 3 earned Awards of Merit, 8 first place awards and 1 Second place award. What surprised me was the T. balbisiana. I entered in the horticultural division, for which I won an Award of Merit. I had had that plant tucked away in my little greenhouse for over a year and frankly hadn't looked at it in a long time. I was surprised how big it had gotten and that it was ready to bloom. The second and best surprise was the arrangement I put together for entry into the DC division. I again had had this T. stricta black tip for some time it too was in bud, had the container for even longer, and was going to use grabbed another plant in it, Ι



the black tip and the other plant, to me they equally looked good. I chose the black tip, and this arrangement won an Award of Merit with a bronze medal and was featured on the head table! WOW! What an honor! All of this was so unexpected for me, I am by no means an expert like the majority of the members who have been growing, displaying, and showing for many years.

I learned so much and gained new acquaintances, it is great fun to be around people of like mind and interest. I had a chance to chat and learn from a judge about how and why I got the marks I did.
