FCBS Website—Did you know that the Florida Council of Bromeliad Societies has a fantastic Photo Index of bromeliads in nearly all genera? Thousands of photos (copyrighted, so please check with webmaster before using any). You can go to that website, directly to the Photo Index from Google, and check out excellent pictures of nearly all bromeliad species, and many hybrids.

This month's tip, from Terrie—To cover or not to cover—that's the question. I grow my bromeliads outdoors, without temperature control. Through the years, I've evolved to cover my plants with frost-cloth if the temperature will be below 40°F for even one night. That takes 2 days (!). Once they're covered, I leave them covered for weeks—a long as there's a chance that the temperature will descend to below 40°F. I have essentially no cold damage. What happens? The temperature under the frost-cloth gets cold at night, but it warms to up to 10-15° higher than ambient temperature in the daytime. Warmth during the day seems to be the key factor keeping my

bromeliads from cold damage. So, to cover is better than not to cover! It's a lot of work, but you'll save your plants. But don't cover with plastic; use frostcloth, sheets, quilts, spare fabric. *Have a good tip on bromeliad care to share? Send it to Terrie Bert.*

MINUTES, SBS DECEMBER, 2015 MEETING:

Minutes from 1/11/16 SBS meeting

The meeting began with the President, Steve Upton, thanking the prior officers for their service, and introducing the new officers to the membership. He also thanked the volunteers for the Selby Festival of Lights and the Hospitality volunteers, and mentioned that we will try to continue with members bringing in food in exchange for a raffle ticket if no one volunteers to head Hospitality.

Steve spoke about the goal in 2016 to increase membership by 20% because new members bring lifeblood & enthusiasm. Bob Stickney reported that we currently have about 70 members. Steve stated that new members can come to three meetings before officially joining.

Ray Lemieux spoke about staying at Selby or moving monthly meetings to The Sarasota Garden Club. The contribution is the same (\$250/yr) but if we stay at Selby we are losing the library, have no kitchen, show or Christmas party access. The Sarasota Garden Club (SGC) is \$400/yr. We would have to meet on a different day (suggested--the third Monday of each month). Kay Weber is an executive board memeber at SGC and is exploring the possibility of getting a discount. By a unanimous voice vote, Ray and Steve were authorized to work with SGC to finalize the change of venue.

Terry Bert stated the show and sale are our primary fundraiser, so the SGC is a better option. Every venue is booked in advance & it is hard to have a spring show. Terry made a motion to move to SGC and it was seconded. She will notify members via the newsletter, and Steve will notify members via the evite.

Ray stated that he will house the library at his residence. Anyone who wants library books should contact him before the meeting and he will bring them to the meeting. A list of all the books in the library will be posted on the Website.

Tiffany Reynolds suggested that posters can be displayed in her office and that the SBS needs to attract younger members. She and new member Raleigh Barnes agreed to form a committee with that as a goal. Tiffany also volunteered to greet/welcome new members.

Betty Gundlack offered to update the Facebook page, she is a part-time resident and member of the Lemon Bay Garden Club.

Eva Talbot spoke about Children's Garden and the importance of getting young people interested in gardening.

Ray will be the show-committee chair, while Terry will be the co-chair for the 2016 show.

Susan Stobo, the outgoing Treasurer, reviewed the 2016 budget and it was approved, Tiffany Reynolds, the new Treasurer reports the CD matures Jan 17th, the interest rate is 0.75%. Tiffany will see that it rolls over to the best rate possible.

Guest Speaker David Johnston hosted a fun Bromeliad Jeopardy competition. Prizes went to three different categories of member.
